Dear Parents,

Thank you all for your attendance at parents' evening over the last two evenings. Along with looking at the books and speaking to teachers, I hope you have a good understanding of the progress your child/ren has made since the Autumn Term. Across the school we have been very impressed with the quality of work the children are producing, not just in Maths and English but also in the wider curriculum including history, geography, music, art and PE. It was obvious from the conversations that we have had with you



over the last two evenings that the relationship between home and school is strong at Kingslea. As I always say, children make great progress when parents and school work together. Those children that read with an adult every night, that have good attendance and where the school's and home values are in sync really do make great progress.

A few weeks ago, we invited in an independent school improvement partner to spend two days in school visiting classrooms, talking to children about their learning and talking to teachers about the subjects they lead. We did this because we wanted independent feedback about the culture and atmosphere in the school, the quality of learning, to challenge us to further improve and identify any blind spots. The key message that came out was that children at Kingslea are at the heart of what we do and why we do it.



This may seem obvious, but it's key to what makes a school. Relationships across the school and the positive learning environment came out very strongly. The school improvement partner was impressed with how consistently well-engaged children were in lessons and in their work and that they were able to explain what they are learning. He also spoke about the quality of work displayed around the school and that the work in children's books is of a consistently high quality, with children taking pride in their work. Time was spent with some of our teachers talking about the curriculum, with staff having thought hard about what they want to achieve, by when and how lessons will be sequenced. All in all it was a positive experience which we will further build on.

I have had a look at next half-term's calendar and I'm genuinely excited about how much is going on. We've got the cross country competition at Christ's Hospital, 'survival training' in Leechpool Woods (for Y5 children not the staff!), a visit to Wakehurst Place, football cup competitions, a visit to the Forest school for a printing session, financial education lessons for all year groups, a visit to Horsham Park, the Rainbow Theatre visiting, a visit to Arundel Wetland Trust, the netball tournaments continue, a visit to



Greenwich Maritime Museum and one of our favourite events of the year—the Welly Walk. I'd like to thank all the teachers for all the events that they plan to enhance the curriculum.

In a new initiative, our House Captains will be visiting other schools to see what it's like to be a child in those schools. They will look at the culture, the school day, what lessons are like and bring their ideas back to me to see how we can take great things from other local schools and implement them here. Have a lovely half-term.



#### **UKMT 25th Anniversary Challenge**

This half term, the UKMT (United Kingdom Mathematics Trust) held a one-off '25th Anniversary Challenge' that some of our Year 6s took part in. We often take part in their challenges in the summer term, which are designed for children in Key Stage 3 and offer awards if the children do well. The challenges encourage mathematical reasoning, precision of thought, and fluency in using basic mathematical techniques to solve interesting problems. It's a real challenge for some of our experienced mathematicians and really gets them thinking. During this challenge, although there were no awards, as it was a 'one-off', we were especially proud of everyone who took part. Everyone scored on challenge – most above 10 – and we even had Khushi and Jamie who scored 19 out of 25! We are now looking forward to the summer challenges and have no doubt that our children will do well.

#### **Covid Update**

As per my email the other day, Covid cases amongst children at Kingslea are at the highest level we have seen at any point during the pandemic, reflecting the national picture amongst primary aged children. Covid cases per 100,000 of the population in Horsham are almost twice the national average and nationally, cases are highest in primary aged children with between 10-15% of primary aged children testing positive in the last few weeks in England, although I do wonder if all LFT tests are being reported, and if it could actually be higher.

At Kingslea this week, we had 15% of children off with Covid. The high rates amongst children are also impacting on staff, with over 20% of staff absent this week with Covid. This is obviously not a sustainable situation, either for the health and well-being of staff and children or for the running of the school. I understand that next week the government is sharing it's plan for 'living with Covid'. I did contact the Education Secretary Nadim Zahawi to share my thoughts, but sadly he's not got back to me. It does seem to me that primary schools have been forgotten about / ignored with little useful support seen from the Department for Education.
