

Dear Parents/Carers,

Along with the usual day-to-day housekeeping information, this newsletter will give you a glimpse into how we develop teaching and learning at Kingslea. I will also explain the four key areas we are focusing on this year and what they mean in the classroom and at home.

But first, let me tell you about Dave Brailsford. Up until 2014, Dave was the director of performance for British Cycling. Prior to his employment in 2003, Team GB cyclists had won just a single gold medal at the Olympics in 95 years. Since he managed the team, his athletes have won more than 20 golds, topping the medal table at both the 2012 and 2016 games. It's a very impressive story but the curious among you will be wondering how Dave Brailsford and his team achieved this.

Dave is regularly quoted referring to something called *marginal gains*: the idea that if you improve elements of your performance by just 1%, the overall result will be much improved. All professional athletes follow a similar idea. They have a coach who observes their skills, identifying areas for improvement (e.g. the power in a tennis serve, the angle a foot strikes the ball in a soccer free kick, the height of the ball when shooting in netball), practising the improvement of this area over and over. This helps athletes to get at least 1% better in that area before identifying another area to improve—all of this with the hope of improving the athlete's overall performance in competitive situations.

Teaching is, in many ways, very different to professional sports (!) but our own experience at Kingslea supports the research which states that the most effective way for teachers to improve follows a similar process. As part of my role as Deputy Headteacher, I lead on teaching and learning in the school with a team of coaches. There are five of us who spend time in classrooms and with teachers having discussions which improve learning for your children. We observe teachers, identifying an area where—with the teacher putting in time to practise and develop that area—learning could be improved by at least 1%. This area is practised with the teacher and then embedded in daily teaching.



Currently, as a school we are collectively working to develop four key areas of teaching and learning: Effective Questioning—using questions which make children think deeply about their learning.

Feedback—ensuring both teachers and children know how well they are doing with the learning and putting things in place to help children improve further or to support them.

Retrieval Practice—giving the time for children to remember and practise what they've already learned so they don't forget it.

Use of Teaching Assistants—making best use of support staff, particularly during the teaching time at the start of a lesson.

At home, you can help with some of these areas. When you're reading with your child, encourage them to develop their understanding of the story by asking questions about what has happened so far and why. Also, encourage children to explain some of their learning to you as this will help secure their new knowledge and skills in their long-term memory. This is the purpose of the homework we set but you could also look over the school Twitter feed to find out what they've been learning and ask them to give you further details. Activities like these help to forge the link between home and school to enable Kingslea pupils to be even more successful in their learning.

World War One Focus

Mr Townsley, our outdoor learning teacher, also happens to be a WW1 expert and documentary/re-enactment actor; he can be seen in the CBBC show Operation Ouch, a medical history programme. Mr Townsley tours the country teaching mainly secondary pupils about WW1. At Kingslea, Mr Townsley has been working with each year group, talking about the life of a solider, showing the children a soldiers kit and weaponry, discussing life in the trenches and the symbolism of the poppy.

This week, all year groups will be focusing on WW1 at a level appropriate to their age. Each year group will have a book as a stimulus for the work they are doing and will focus on a particular area of WW1.

Reception and Year 1: Elfa and the Box of Memories—looking at what life was like in the 1910s, with a focus on toys.

Year 2: Where the Poppies now grow—focusing on the life of a solider.

Year 3: *Flo of the Somme*—with a particular focus on animals at war.

Year 4 : Archie's War—with a particular focus on Horsham during WW1 and family life during the war.

Year 5: Walter Tull's Scrapbook—with a focus on the contribution of the Commonwealth.

Year 6 are studying many aspects of WW1 all term, including the role of women during the war.

Poppy display

As part of our work on WW1 every child in the school has painted a poppy. During half-term the poppies were put together to form a wave which is now displayed on the bridge over Harwood Road. If you haven't seen it please do have a look, it is very powerful.

Our pupil governors will be in the playground selling poppies this week, with all funds raised going to the British Legion Poppy Appeal.
