
# The Kingslea Review

**Sky Chasers** by Emma Carroll is a fantastic adventure story based on the real life Montgolfier family and their quest to be the first people in the world to create a hot air

balloon. The story follows Magpie, a young thief, who is employed by a shadowy figure to steal the Montgolfier's plans. However things don't go quite to plan and with faithful pet cockerel Coco coming along for the ride, Magpie enters a world of suspicion, mystery and science. Embarking on a desperate race against time to make sure that the French not the English are the first nation to take to the sky Magpie also has to keep her dark burglar past secret from those around her. Can she do it and will she ever take to the sky?



# Recommended by Brightstorm author, Vashti Hardy

I would like to recommend Alex Sparrow and the Furry Fury by Jennifer Killick. If you've already read Alex Sparrow and the Really Big Stink, you'll already know that you're in for a gigglingly great read. Alex and Jess are back, and their embarrassing super powers are out in force as they try to solve the mystery of why the animals at the local sanctuary are terrified, alongside other strange events such as squirrels turning mean. What I love most about book 2 is that we see Alex and Jess's characters develop; beneath their often prickly relationship there is a real and warm friendship.

You'll love the animals too, especially Bob the Goldfish and Mr Prickles the hedgehog! The Alex books never fail to make me shoulder-shake laugh, but most of all, this story is about the power of kindness. I think there are lots of young readers out there for who this could ignite a real love of story. This book is divided into short, readable chapters, each one ending on a cliff hanger, with illustrations throughout. You will be on the edge of your seat and you will never see the natural world the same away again.

## Year 5-6 Recommendation


**Brightstorm** by Vashti Hardy is a true adventure rollercoaster full of intrigue, suspense and a whole myriad of wonderful, loveable characters that will leave you hoping for more. Our heroes are the recently-orphaned Brightstorm twins, Maude and Arthur

whose father has been accused of stealing! This means they will lose all of the inheritance they were due to receive. With no money and no prospects, they are thrown into a dark Dickensian world that they see no escape from. However the arrival of their father's missing friend heralds a change in their fortune and they are swept away on a wonderful race to the South Polaris. Lurking in the shadows remains a dangerous figure however and the twins best watch their step!

Hidden Figures: The True Story of Four Black Women and the Space Race by Margot Lee Shetterly tells the story of the women behind the maths that won the space race. A picture book version of the award winning film, this book is interesting, informative and prompts some wonderful conversations.



**The Buildings that Made London** by David Long (illustrations by Josie Shenoy) takes the reader on a tour of some of the most significant London landmarks including St Pauls, Big Ben and Kew Gardens. 

## Recommended by Isla in 5K—The Explorer by Katherine Rundell



She finds herself engulfed in an undercover operation aided by friends she has made along the way.

One thing which makes this book unique is the inclusion of maps in each chapter so it is easy to identify where Cass is on her quest around the islands. With a brilliant main character and an exciting plot, this is a charming story for children in years 5 or 6 to enjoy, especially if they are riding the circus waves after enjoying The Greatest Showman.
