Reading 🔚

Each day this week we are going to read part of a text: The Egyptian Cinderella by Shirley Climo.

Activity: Read the third part of the text (See attached). Now look back at the text and see if you can find a phrase, word, or sentence that tells you that Rhodopis was...

1. Frightened 2. Desperate 3. Upset

Remember that when we read a text, readers can interpret things in different ways. If you can't find a phrase, word or sentence that explains how Rhodopis felt, try explaining one of her feelings yourself. E.g. I know that Rhodopis was frightened because the falcon was massive and came out of nowhere. This would have scared her, even though the falcon was a symbol of a god.

Another way of doing this could be in a table, like the example below:

Feeling	Quote from the text	My explanation
Frightened	'Rhodopis jumped up.'	People jump up when they are
		scared and the giant falcon
		shocked her when she saw it's
		shadow fall on the water.

If you would like an extra written task today, write a prediction for what you think might happen next in the story.

Writing/English

Activity: At this point in Egyptian Cinderella, we do not know much about the Pharoah, Amasis. There is a brief description and a picture of him in the last page from today's section. Can you choose one of the following writing tasks, based on Amasis. You have creative license here to make up as much as you like about him!

Option 1- Write a story about Amasis the Pharoah.

Option 2- Describe a chariot race that Amasis had.

Option 3- Write a conversation (using inverted commas) that Amasis might have had with his advisors when they made him put on the heavy, double crown.

Challenge: (This might be useful to do first if you choose option 2) Research and write some key information about Ancient Egyptian chariot races.

Maths 📶


For maths this week, we are going to be looking at statistics (representing and interpreting data and graph work). Everything we have set you for maths up to now has been revision from year 4, but you won't have done statistics since year 3. Please do email us if you need any further clarification.

Activity: You're going to like this one... Think of a topic for 'Our Favourite...' You can use colours, crisp flavours, animals... anything you like! I recommend you choose 4 options and each person selects 1 of them. (E.g. for favourite animals, they can only choose from cats, dogs, rabbits, or horses.) You need to ask 10 people their opinions- ask your family that you live with first. This is a good opportunity to ring, or message classmates, friends and relatives, but please ask permission from an adult first (and make sure you ask them how they are before asking them to answer your survey!) Gather your data in a tally chart, like the one below:

Animal	Tally	Total number of people
Shark	111	3

Then you can present your data in a graph (like the one below for 'Our favourite Ice-cream'-remember you will need to think about the scale as with only 10 people, it won't need to be as big as the example below. Keep your tally chart and bar chart safe as you will need them for tomorrow's task too!
