Weds	Expanded noun phrases	Use expanded noun phrases to convey complicated information concisely. Revise adding adjectives to describe the noun in a sentence. Form expanded noun phrases with prepositions. e.g. <u>The house adjacent to the park</u> was derelict.	Expanded noun phrase attachment Expanded noun phrase activity sheets attached	Look through the slides and complete the activity sheets.
Thurs	Subordinate clauses	Understand that subordinate clauses are phrases that are parts of a sentence and identify where they can be placed within a sentence. Add a main clause to sentences which begin with subordinate clauses.	Subordinate clause attachment Subordinate clause activity sheet attached	Look through the slides and complete the activity sheet.

Fri	Relative clauses	A relative clause is a type of subordinate clause and is introduced by a relative pronoun (who, whom, whose, which, that). Use relative pronouns to write relative clauses with commas either side of the clause.	Relative clause attachment Commas and relative clause activity sheet attached	Look through the slides and then complete the activity sheet.
